HIGHLIGHTS and NEW INITIATIVES

- Offered an Employer Partners Breakfast to thank recruiters for a successful year. The event included university updates by President Hawkinson, and sessions on Career Readiness, Generation Z Trends, Upskilling and Reskilling for the Workforce, a networking session with KU faculty, and a tour of the SMASH lab.
- Coordinated two employer site visits and tours for 37 students to ADP and Clark Associates.
- Coordinated snack breaks for five KU sports teams to visit and introduce the Career Center.
- Offered a Career Closet Open House for faculty and staff to tour the closet and attract more donors.
- Hosted, in partnership with the Men's Golf Club and College of Business, an inaugural Career Classic fundraising golf event at Golden Oaks Golf Club. In addition to golfing and networking, registrants had the option to select and play golf with KU students.
- Employer representatives from Clark Associates and Comcast visited campus and presented workshops to students on career topics.
- Created a 'Positive Influencer' recognition program for employees, by adding a question in the First-Destination Survey allowing graduating students the opportunity to nominate those who positively influenced them during their time at KU.

Here are just a few of the numerous CDC events for students:


- Collaboration with Disabilities Services Office to offer the Federal Workforce Recruitment Program

- Internship and Job Fairs, a Graduate School Fair, and Education Job Fairs each semester

Student Engagement

Over half of all undergraduate students (52%) engaged with the Career Center staff, including 65% of freshmen and 60% of seniors.

Career Coaching/Counseling Appointments



One of the most valuable services provided for students and alumni are one-on-one career counseling appointments, via phone or video and, of course, in-person. Staff had just under 800 career appointments with students this year.

Students participating in the career certificate program had the most appointments talking with career coaches about their choice of major or career path, in addition to strategies for internship and job searching.

Review Service

At the Center, staff members engage with students to review resumes and cover letters helping students present their education and talents to prospective employers and graduate schools.

• In the 2022-23 academic year, 3656 documents were reviewed.



Certificate Programs

The two specially-designed professional development certificates help students become stronger, more confident, successful future employees! Strategic outreach to key faculty through the First Year and Senior Seminar courses had 24 faculty incorporate the program into their courses, with just over 1,100 students actively working toward earning their certificates.

Upon completion of the Career Success Certificate, there was an increase in students knowing how to:






Employer Engagement

Handshake Postings

Handshake is the primary online resource for preparing and connecting students and alumni with employers as well as on-campus opportunities.

This year, the number of posting of full-time listings increased 12% and internships increased 36%, with the highest number of positions posted to date.
