

Dr. Duenyas and current KU graduate students Adam Christian (CMH) and Isaiah Smola (CMH) presented scholarly research at the annual Chi Sigma Iota Statewide conference. The roundtable titled, "A Neuroscience-Informed Guiding Metaphor for Graduate Counseling Students," facilitated discussion regarding how graduate counseling students are integrating neuroscience-informed counseling into their professional identity development. The roundtable session provided an overview of current professional literature focused on the use of metaphor as a tool to develop and assess counselor's neuroscience-informed professional identity development.



Dr. Cohen and graduate students Lakshmi Nair-Kanangottu (MCFC) and Paul Gurule (CMH) presented at the APA Division 32, Society for Humanistic Psychology Conference in March 2023. The presentation topic was "Racial Engagement of Immigrant Families within a Collaborative Community-Based Clinical Trauma Counseling Program: Three Case Illustrations."

Dr. Duenyas, Dr. Krahwinkel, and KU alumni Andre Sumiel recently had a research article titled, "Experience of Underrepresented Students in Master's-Level Counselor Education Programs" accepted for publication in the Journal of Counselor Preparation and Supervision.

The purpose of this phenomenological investigation was to understand the racial and ethnic experiences of underrepresented Master's-level counseling graduate students in CACREP-accredited counselor education programs. Data analysis revealed four composite themes that comprised students' experience.

The themes were: Perceived Cultural Competence, Individual Characteristics, Connection and Advocacy, and Bringing "It" Up. Implications on how counselor education programing and curriculum can provide support for underrepresented students were included.


Dr. Jill M. Krahwinkel

Her approach to counseling is rooted in Reality Therapy with emphasis on Relational Cultural Theory, emphasizing that the counseling relationship is the agent of change to help clients meet their desired goals.




Social Justice Award

Dear Mr. Elbaum,

Thank you for contacting me regarding your support for increased mental health education and training for first responders and House Bill 2852 (98 2852) from the previous legislative session. I appreciate that you have taken the time to contact me about these important issues.

Regarding mental health services for first responders, I voted in favor of Act 69 of 2020, which established the Emergency Responder Mental Wellness and Stress Management Program. This legislation required the Socretary of the Department of Health (DOH) to develop a mental wellness and stress management protocol to assist emergency responders who suffer or have suffered from a posttraumatic stress injury (PTSI) or a Traumatic Brain Injury (TESI), and emergency responders who have been esposed to a critical incident resulting from employment. This law also required DOH to establish a poer-to-peer support program with services that include mental health treatment and recovery; chemical and substance abuse dependency treatment, sexual abuse trauma treatment and recovery. This legislation also required DOH to provide for trauma and suicide awareness and impact training that includes education on stress management, critical incidents, signs and symptoms of PTSI, trauma, substance abuse and addiction, depression and suicide warning signs, and availability or resources.

I also wanted to make you aware of Senate (bill 365-(SS 365), which is attempting to entablish a workers' compensation claim for a post-traumatic stress injusy (PTS). Under this legislation, PTSI claims will require diagnosis from a licensed psychiatrist or psychiatric Association Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders. If this legislation passes in the Senate and connes before me for consideration in the House, I will certainly keep your thoughts in mind. 
