Academic Policies

Grade Point Average

Academic regulations are based upon your grade point average (G.P.A.) The G.P.A. measures a student's academic standing within the university. For the purpose of computing grade point average, each letter grade carries a given number of quality points as shown. Please note that financial aid progress requirements are not the same as the University's academic policy. Advice from an academic advisor may differ from wat is needed to maintain financial aid eligibility

Credits are used to determine the classification of a student. Included are those credits earned at KU, and credits earned at other institutions that are accepted by KU on the basis of official transcripts.

How to Improve your GPA

One way for you to bring up your grade point average (G.P.A.) is to repeat courses which you feel you could earn a higher grade. Students can also take summer and winter sessions to repeat classes as well as take other classes to raise their GPA. Be sure to use the services of CASA (Center for Academic Success and Achievement) which provides academic help and access to student tutors.

If you recieve financial aid, check with Financial Aid before repeating a class. This could negatively impact your financial aid progress and future aid eligibility.

Dean's List

At the end of the fall and spring semester, an academic achievement list, or the Dean's List, is made public. Eligibility for inclusion on the list is determined by a semester GPA of 3.60, provided that the student is registered for at least 12 credits with letter grades, and is pursuing a degree at KU.

Change of Major/ Minor Advisor

Any student may request a change of major, minor, or academic advisor. However individual academic departments often have special criteria that must be satisfied before approval for change of major is granted. Students should check the program and department requirements carefully before making such a request.

All changes of major, minor, or academic advisor will become effective on the date that the request is received in the Registrar's Office. All changes of major, minor, or academic advisor must be made prior to the end of final examination week.

Add/Drop period

Add/Drop period is a period of time, depending on the semester or summer session, that allows the student to add or drop courses without receiving a "W" grade and may adjust their costs. In a general semester, this period of time is about one week. During the summer and winter this period of time is about two days.

Withdrawing from a course

You can withdraw from a single course with a grade of 'W' between the 2nd and 10th week of the fall or spring semester. (Winter and spring term withdrawal dates are within the first week). Go to the Registrar's Office located in the Stratton Administration Bldg. to withdraw from a course. (Withdrawing from a course can impact a student's financial aid progress. Consult with the Financial Aid Office in advance).

Course Repeats

All undergraduate students will be limited to a maximum total of six repeats at Kutztown University. A single course can be repeated a maximum of two times. The most recent grade (regardless of whether it is higher or lower) will be the grade used for the GPA calculation.

Academic Good Standing

Maintaining a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.00 or higher for all work taken at Kutztown University is a requirement.

Academic Warning

Any full-time student falling below the 2.00 cumulative GPA at the end of any given fall or spring semester will be placed on academic warning. Part-time students will be evaluated every 12 credits and will receive an academic warning whenever this evaluation shows their cumulative GPA to have fallen below 2.00. A student is allowed only one semester of academic warning in his/her academic career at Kutztown University.

Academic Probation

A student who falls below the 2.00 cumulative GPA after one full-time semester of academic warning shall be placed on academic probation. A part-time student who has received an academic warning must bring his or her cumulative GPA up to 2.00 or higher within 12 credits attempted or be placed on academic probation. The University will notify the student, in writing, that he/she is in danger of dismissal. A student is allowed only one semester of academic probation in his/her academic career at Kutztown University.

Academic Dismissal

A student who falls below the 2.00 cumulative GPA after one full-time semester of probation will be dismissed from the University. A part-time student who is on academic probation must bring his or her cumulative GPA up to 2.00 or higher within 12 credits attempted or will be dismissed. Dismissal letters are sent out at the end of the fall and spring semesters.

How can a student change their name?

Legal Name: Students are able to change their legal names by filling out the Student Change of Name form and providing documentation of the name change. (Marriage Certificate, Divorce Decree, Court Order)

Preferred Name: Students can change their preferred name by filling out the Preferred Name Change Request form on the Registrar's website. This preferred name will not affect the legal name being displayed through MyKU and other official records (i.e. transcripts, diplomas, financial records, etc.). The preferred name is applicable only for Kutztown internal systems.

How to study at another college/university

Students wishing to study at another university/college and transfer the credits earned back to Kutztown University must obtain permission from the Kutztown University Registrar's Office in writing prior to enrollment.

- Students taking Business core courses will need approval from their College Dean.
- Students in Elementary Education will need the department chair's approval for all courses.

How do I transfer credits from another college to Kutztown University?

Send an official transcript to the Office of Admissions prior to beginning your career at KU. Thereafter, send the transcript to the Registrar's Office. Transfer credits will be evaluated once the official transcript is received by the university. Questions regarding transfer credit evaluations can be directed to the Registrar's Office. Please be prepared to provide a description or a syllabus from the course.

How do I add my CLEP or AP credits to my transcript?

Contact the College Board directly and have an official school report sent to:

Testing Services, Kutztown University, Room 201, Graduate Center P.O. Box 730, Kutztown PA 19530.

Grades of '3' or higher on some AP exams may be considered for credit at KU.

Graduation with Honors

Kutztown University recognizes a student's scholastic achievement upon graduation by recording honors on the permanent record and in the commencement program. The cumulative GPA needed for this distinction is:

Summa Cum Laude (with highest honors)	3.80
Magna Cum Laude (with high honors)	3.60
Cum Laude (with honor)	3.40

Advising

Your Academic Advisor is a faculty member who will guide and advise you in matters such as selecting and scheduling courses, establishing and evaluating academic goals, understanding and navigating university policies and procedures, exploring academic majors and related careers, declaring a major, and connecting with other university programs and resources.

You must meet with your Academic Advisor each academic semester prior to registering for the next semester. You are encouraged to utilize the range of resources and services available to you through your advisor. In order to find out more information about your assigned Academic Advisor, please refer to your MyKU account. Your Academic Advisor's name should be located under the "student center" tab. On the right-hand side of the page, a drop box labeled "advisor" will show you your assigned advisor's information.

Advising F.A.Q.'s

I wasn't able to enter into the major I really wanted. How can I get into that major now?

First, it is important to know why you were not admitted to your major of choice. Some programs have enrollment caps and others have specific admissions requirements. If you are unsure why you were not admitted to your major of choice, contact the Admissions Office. During your advising session at orientation, you will have the opportunity to discuss the possibilities of changing your major.

Transfer Student Tips

See your Academic Advisor regularly. Your academic advisor can help you select courses and stay on track towards graduation. Meet with your advisor at least once per semester, if not more, to discuss your career goals and to plan out your classes for the next semester.

How do I know what courses will transfer to KU?

The online Transfer Course Evaluation will show you what courses typically transfer from your institution. To officially transfer your courses to Kutztown University (KU), you must request that an official transcript be sent directly from the Registrar's Office of all your previous institutions to the Admissions Office at Kutztown University, P.O. Box 730, Kutztown, PA 19530. Your transcripts will be evaluated by the Admissions Office and a determination of transfer credit will be made.

How do I declare a major if I'm an Exploratory Studies Student/change my major from one program to another/add a minor or double major?

If you are an Exploratory Studies student, check with your advisor first to make sure you meet all the qualifications for the new major. Once you've been cleared, you can speak with that academic department and they will assist you to make the change. If you're currently in a major (English, Math, History, etc.) and want to switch to another program, go to the Academic Department you want to switch to and speak with them directly. This is also the same process if you want to add a double major or a minor.

STUDENT ACCOUNTS

The Office of Student Accounts is located in Stratton Administration Center, Room 225. Questions may be directed by email to studentaccounts@kutztown.edu or by telephone at 610-683-4133. It is important to remember that bills include tuition, fees, housing and meals. These are only available online through the student's MyKU. They are not mailed.

TUITION BILLING

Students will be sent an email to their KU email account when their bill is ready to view and pay. Bills are not

mailed, but can be viewed in MyKU. Fall invoices are prepared early July and due early August. Spring bills are prepared early December and due early January. Summer and winter session due dates are in MyKU and assigned based on when you register. The Intent To Attend in MyKU is where you confirm your attendance. It preserves your schedule and allows KU to receive any aid that you may have authorized. (This occurs after billing). Each fall and spring term, confirm your intent to attend by placing a check in the box below your schedule in the "Student Center" section of MyKU, and clicking the SAVE button. A time stamp will be present to show it

had been completed successfully.

REFUND PROGRAM

MyKU accounts may at times be overpaid. If they are, we need to know how to get your funds to you the way you want. The choice is yours, and you make this choice online at www.refundselection.com using a personal code mailed to your home in a green envelope prior to you starting your first semester at KU. This should arrive in July or later. Even if you don't expect a refund, we want you to make that choice now. Parent PLUS loan refunds will be issued to the parent in the form of a paper check mailed to your home address unless they granted permission on the application to release the funds to the student.

Refund Options include:

- 1. Direct Deposit to their own bank account of choice
- 2. Opening an online FDIC insured account with the refund company

STAFFORD LOANS

The most common loan students use are Stafford loans. To receive Stafford Loans, students must complete Entrance Counseling online AND complete a Master Promissory Note (MPN). Both of these can be done at: www.studentloans.gov as early as June.

PARENT PLUS LOANS – These loans are a loan a parent takes in their name to help the student. The parent logs into www.studentloans.gov and applies. If approved, they sign their own Master Promissory Note, in their name, under their own FSA ID and password.

ALTERNATIVE LOANS – These loans are in the student's name but they most often need a credit worthy co-signer. Review lenders and apply at www.elmselect.com

FERPA (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act).

We highly encourage all students to complete an Authorization Form each academic year if they have others helping them with questions about their account. Without written permission from the student, we are unable to disclose any information including balances due. www.kutztown.edu/FERPA

BOOKSTORE ACCOUNTS

Students who are expecting a refund from their aid package overpaying their account may be able to use some of that refund for books and required materials in the KU Campus Store. Students may apply to do this only if their MyKU account is in good standing and showing an anticipated credit balance. Apply online on the Financial Aid website starting one week before the semester and through Add/Drop.

VERIFICATION

Many students are selected for verification of their federal aid (FAFSA). This means that the Financial Aid Office would be asking for tax transcripts, W-2's and a form to be completed. Do not delay when you see these items in your To Do box on MyKU.

TO DO/HOLDS

The MyKU Student Center contains information to help students. Once they enter the Student Center, they will see their courses, costs and more. This includes any holds (positive or negative) and items that are needed (To Do's). Check these often.

The staff of Financial Aid Services invites you to contact them for all of your financial aid needs: call (610) 683-4077, email financialaid@kutztown.edu, or visit the website at www.kutztown.edu/financialaid for assistance. The staff is there to guide you through the financial aid process and the requirements which affect your eligibility.

HOW DO I APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID?

- File the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online at www.fafsa.gov.
- Both the student and parent each need an FSA ID and password (replaces the FAFSA pin # used in the past). These will allow students and parents to electronically sign as needed on the FAFSA and master promissory notes (MPNs).KU's priority filing deadline is January 31 of each year. File a FAFSA for every year you plan to be enrolled. Even if you missed the January 31 deadline, you can still file, although you may not be considered for every type of aid. Some types of aid, such as the Pennsylvania State Grant, have a strict filing deadline of May 1. We encourage you to file the PHEAA state grant by April 23.
- All first-time student Stafford loan borrowers need to go to www.studentloans.gov to complete entrance counseling and sign a master promissory note. The student will use their FSA ID to electronically sign the master promissory note.

Students who need to raise their GPA to qualify for financial aid will need to take classes at Kutztown University, because transfer credits do not affect KU GPAs. Taking classes at another institution will increase a student's completion average, but may not be enough to regain financial aid eligibility. Financial aid progress is measured after every period of enrollment (fall, winter, spring and summer).

If a student drops below the minimum requirements following a term of good financial aid standing, they are permitted to have a financial aid warning term, in which they will still receive federal Title IV financial aid. If they do not regain satisfactory financial aid progress by the end of the warning term, they will lose all federal Title IV aid until they have met the following

financial aid progress requirements:

- 1. Successfully complete 2/3 of the total cumulative credits attempted. Credits attempted are: all credits for which the student is enrolled at the end of the drop/add period at KU. This means the greater of either consortium credits attempted at another school OR the number of credits transferred into KU after admission and credits attempted in certain study abroad programs.
- 2. You must also maintain a cumulative GPA of at least 2.0 at the end of each period of enrollment (fall, winter, spring, and summer).

Federal Title IV aid includes Pell, SEOG, Federal Perkins Loan, Federal Work Study, Federal Stafford Loan, Federal Parent Loan (PLUS Loans). PHEAA state grant is state aid and carries different academic progress requirements

Repeats of classes for which the student received a passing grade do not count as new credits. Withdrawing from a course after Drop/Add may mean the student is short the number of credits needed for financial aid progress.

Only credits earned from a course in which the student was actually enrolled will count for financial aid progress. CLEP credits (credits received by challenge exam), and credits received as a result of placement testing to determine proficiency are not included in the financial aid progress formula and cannot be used to meet progress.



The Rohrbach Library is a viable resource for its students, faculty, staff and the Kutztown community. RL houses collections of books, DVDs, and various electronic resources. Our electronic resources include over 200,000 EBooks and full-text articles located in one of our 200+ searchable databases.

Our mission is to facilitate academic research and lifelong learning by integrating information literacy and critical thinking processes into the curriculum through the selection and provision of high quality information resources, professional services, and technologies to our diverse community.

Study and Relax

Rohrbach Library has **122,667 square feet and 1050 chairs for students**. The library also has a **café and a balcony with outdoor seating** located on the first floor. Students can check out a wireless laptop from the circulation desk, grab a drink or snack from the Book & Brew, and settle into a seat.

Technology at RL

Access to a wireless connection (BearNet) for free Wifi.

Phone charging stations and **book scan stations** located on the first floor.

About the Hall Staff

The Assistant Resident Directors (ARD):

Experienced, undergraduate (junior or senior) members of the Residence Life Team are supervised by the Resident Director and are responsible to the Assistant Director in the areas of scheduling and timecards. He/She is responsible for the efficient day to day operation of the front desk, as well as assisting the Resident Director in the areas of staff supervision, leadership development, and administrative tasks. The Assistant Resident Director is a livein, student employment position within Residence Life.

The Community Assistant (CA):

An undergraduate member of the Residence Life staff and is supervised by the Resident Director. CAs establish a rapport with resident students and assist these students in the adjustment to community living and university. Community Assistants clearly communicate, implement and/or enforce University policies and Housing, Residence Life, and Dining Services procedures. They are responsible for overseeing the residents in areas related to community development, responsible community membership, programming,

communication, intervention and mediation, as well as, providing leadership to the entire hall when active in the duty rotation. CAs are valuable resources for our residential students.

Desk Receptionists (DR):

Serve as the first point of contact for our residents, their families, and guests. They are an information resource for the campus and a vital part of the community building process that takes place in the residence halls. Desk Receptionists play a key role in making the halls a home away from home for our students.

The Resident Director (RD):

A graduate student and a member of Kutztown University's Residence Life Team, the Resident Director is responsible for student success and retention through efficient day-to-day operation of a residence hall while adhering to the mission and core values of the department.

Special Interest Housing

Special Interest Housing is a program that offers the same benefits and ideals as the Living Learning Communities offer to our students. Students enjoy all the usual advantages of living

on-campus in a residence hall, with the added benefit of living among a group of students that shares similar interests or characteristics. Students in these communities live floor with others who share the common interest of the theme of the floor, but are not required to have that interest or topic as their academic major. The students in these communities are not required to share the same major, and do not typically have an academic course assigned to their program.

Residence Hall What is F.Y.R.E

The First Year Residential Experience (F.Y.R.E) Program at Kutztown University seeks to increase student retention by providing multi-layered support to first year students living in the residence halls. The F.Y.R.E program provides opportunities for first year students to interact with upper-class students and community members through various forms of daily collaboration. The program includes: a weekly email series that starts the first week of classes and ends the last week of classes, designed to provide students with KU Resources and aid in the acclimation and transition to college.

Hall Council

This is an organization that is open to all students who live in a residence hall. Each residence hall has its own governing body with an Executive Board that meets weekly to address residency issues, plan events and coordinate fundraisers. Freshmen also have the opportunity to hold an Executive Board position or be a wing representative for their wing. The hall councils are highly

active and visible student organizations on campus.

Residence Hall Association

This is a federation of 13 hall councils that provide Residence Life with the students' viewpoints regarding campus living, organizes campus-wide programs and promotes pride and tradition in living on campus. Although the Residence Hall Association (RHA), is open to everyone, the Presidents and RHA Reps of each hall council make up the membership board. This organization meets weekly.

Bears at Night

The Residence Life Office coordinates student funded programing that takes place on Thursday or Friday evenings. These events include a variety of activities for students.

Any student registered for classes may purchase a meal plan that includes a specific amount of Dining Flex Dollars.

Meal Plan Options

Any student registered for classes may purchase a meal plan. Students living in traditional residence halls or suite-style residence halls must have a MyTime Diamond, MyTime Platinum, or MyTime Gold Meal Plan.

MYTIME DINING DIAMOND

One of three plans students living in traditional or suite style halls can choose from. Provides unlimited access to both all-you-care-to-eat residential dining locations 24 hours a day 7 days per week in the South Dining Hall and normal operating hours in the Cub Café, plus 16 guest meals and \$250 in dining flex per semester. Total cost of the Diamond Meal Plan including dining flex dollars is \$2,025*.

MYTIME DINING PLATINUM

This plan provides those students who are not required to have a meal plan unlimited access to both all-you-care-to-eat residential dining locations 24 hours a day 5 days per week (M-F) in the South Dining Hall and normal operating hours in the Cub Café (M-F), plus 5 guest meals and \$50 in dining flex per semester. **Total cost of the Maroon**

Meal Plan including dining flex dollars is \$1,450*.

MYTIME DINING 150 BLOCK

This plan provides those students who are not required to have a meal plan the flexibility to use 150 meals per semester with access to both all-you-care-to-eat residential dining locations 24 hours a day 7 days per week in the South Dining Hall and normal operating hours in the Cub Café, plus 5 guest meals and \$250 in dining flex per semester. **Total cost of the MyTime 150 Block Meal Plan including dining flex dollars is \$1,500*.**







Campus Lingo

ACE – Association of Campus Events plans many activities for students and is a great way to get involved on campus.

APD (Airport Diner) – The Airport Diner has good food, at a good price.

Add/Drop – The period at the start of each semester when you are able to drop a class without penalty and add a class.

Admin – The Stratton Administration Center is where you can find many student services, like the Career Development Center, Financial Aid, Student Accounts and the Registrar's Office.

AF – The Academic Forum has lecture halls, dining facilities, the mail center, KU Card Office and Starbucks.

Angry Chicken – Refers to the clock tower above Old Main, which looks like an angry chicken from a certain angle.

Bear Bucks – Money stored on your Kutztown ID card that you can use as a debit card. Bear Bucks can be used at the Dining Halls or various places on and off campus.

CA – Community Assistant: an undergraduate student who lives on your floor in your residence hall. CA's plan programs and provide important information you may need during the year.

CASA – Center for Academic Success and Achievement in Rohrbach Library.

Cub Cafe - The cafeteria located on

the second floor of the McFarland Student Union.

DeFran – The DeFrancesco Building is the home to the College of Business.

Dixon Marketplace – KU merchandise and convenience store located at the bottom of Dixon Hall, by the South Dining Hall.

DMZ – The grassy area in the middle of the residence halls on the south side of campus.

Keystone – Refers to the indoor gym where basketball, volleyball, swimming, and other sports games are held. It is also the name of the school newspaper.

Prereq – (prerequisite) A course you need to take before you can take another.

ResNet – The Residence Hall Network: a free student service for help with computer repairs and connectivity. Located in Johnson Hall

Syllabus – A document your professor gives you the first week of class detailing coursework, deadlines and grading/attendance policies of the professor.

SGB – Student Government Board represents students' opinions and oversees the Student Activity Fee.

SUB – Renamed the David E. McFarland Student Union or MSU. Probably one of the most popular spots on campus. This building contains a variety of offices such as ACE, CON-NECTIONS, SGB, Veterans Center, Community Outreach Center and the Office of Student Involvement. You can also find the Campus Store, Cub Café, Starbucks, Kutztown University Radio, PSECU and much more!

South – Refers to one of two locations. One is Golden Bear Village South (the apartments behind University Place). The other is South Dining Hall (which is Kutztown's main cafeteria on the south end of campus).

Tree of Knowledge – The fountain located on the south end of campus in the middle of the DMZ.

TriCounty – The triangle formed by the dorms of Lehigh, Berks, and Schuykill. The dorms are named after three counties surrounding Kutztown.

West – Golden Bear Village West is a collection of small town house apartments next to Rothermel Hall.

The Waterfall – (The Alumni Fountain) the large fountain on north campus near Boehm and the Graduate Center. Check out the color lights at night.

222 – The main road in and out of Kutztown. Main Street is Old 222, while the current 222 loops around town on a bypass. It leads to Reading to the South and Allentown to the North.



As you would probably expect, your relationship with your son or daughter will undergo some change in the coming months and years. Be ready! Here are some tips on how to make the transition smoother for your student and you.

If possible, plan a campus visit (i.e. concert, football game, movie) with your student. Take your son or daughter and their new friends to lunch or dinner or an outing. You will not believe how many friends your student has when a free meal is involved, especially at the end of the semester when money is low. If you include friends, you are a welcomed guest just about any time.

Do not show up on campus unannounced.

Send lots of mail, especially in the beginning of the year. No matter how many times you call or text, they truly want to have something tangible in their mailbox. Your student will be thrilled to receive an article of clothing once in a while or something silly. During the semester, send a beloved food item. If your student comes home for the weekend, send the leftovers back to campus.

If you live in an area where there is a Weis or a Giant, **buy gift cards for your student**. You know the money will go for what it was intended – food.

If your student lives in an apartment, plan to cook a favorite dinner once or twice a year for your student and his/her friends. You will not believe the appreciation you will receive and the love they feel!

For holidays that you are not with them, send something appropriate (i.e. plastic pumpkin filled with Halloween candy, Valentines, Easter baskets, etc.) They love these traditions whether they are at home or not.

Have your student do a weekly budget instead of a monthly budget for the first year.

If your student doesn't know how to do their own laundry, show them now. Save quarters for the machines.

Remember you have limited control over your student. Have patience. Trust your student to make the appropriate decisions.

Treat your student as an adult.

Remember parental guidance does not mean trying to control your student's decisions or actions from home. Keep criticisms to yourself and you will be able to keep the lines of communication open.

Encourage your student to foster a good relationship with their academic advisor and career counselor to continue to seek their advice throughout their time at KU. As students become more confident, they tend to think they know everything. Mistakes

can prove costly in terms of expense and possible delayed graduation. Persuade your son or daughter to develop a network of peers, administrators, faculty and staff they can count on for advice and guidance.

If your student begins to have any academic challenges, contact CASA

(Center for Academic Success and Achievement) early on. Don't wait until they are on academic warning. If you have any questions you can email them at casa@kutztown.edu

Students who get involved on campus have greater academic success than students who study only. KU has over 160 clubs and organizations. Encourage your student to explore

what's available.

It may take longer for your student to complete their degree than originally expected. Whatever the reason, **try** and remain supportive. For transfer students and first-time freshmen, classes may be more demanding than their previous institution. Remind your student about academic support services and career counseling appointments which can help!

Tips for Transfer Students

Follow these tips to make your transition to KU a successful one!

See your academic advisor regularly.

Your academic advisor can help you select courses and stay on track towards graduation.

Don't assume. As a transfer student, you have already experienced a college environment before. However, as you adjust to Kutztown, keep in mind that every college and university operates differently so it's important to educate yourself about Kutztown's policies and practices. Read your email and stay up to date on communications sent by the university. If you have questions, don't wait. Speak with your advisor, department secretary or other KU office personnel.

It is okay to question your decision.

When coming to any new environment, there might be a time when you feel like you are overwhelmed or that you do not belong. This is normal. Try to push through that feeling and stay positive. Believe in yourself, connect with others (faculty, staff and classmates). Each day offers new opportunities.

Ask for help. If you begin to feel overwhelmed, ask for help early on. CASA (Center for Academic Success and Achievement) is a great place to go for assistance and to work with student tutors. Talk with faculty about your concerns in class. They are here to help. Make a career counseling appointment to confirm your career plan and goals.

Get out there and meet people. It can be very easy to stay in your residence

hall or apartment and only come to campus for class, but to get the full KU experience take a chance and get out there and meet people. Start with your classes. Form a study group and plan to meet for coffee or a meal. Join a club or attend one of KU's amazing student activities like a bus trip to NYC or volunteer for a community service project. Before long, you'll meet lots of amazing new friends!

Check and use your KU email

regularly. All official University communications are sent through KU email. Get in the habit of checking this daily. Link your KU email to your personal email for easy updates.

Become familiar with KU locations/lingo and traditions. Check this book for an introduction to commonly used terms and traditions. Familiarize yourself with the campus by reviewing the maps at: https://www.kutztown.edu/campusmap.

Figure out where to park. Register your vehicle through your MyKU. Parking decals can be picked up at the Office of Public Safety approximately two weeks before the start of the semester. You will need your car registration and a form of photo ID. Be sure your sticker is on by the first day of class. Each student decal is identified with a letter. This signifies where you can park on campus. Visit https://www.kutztown.edu/about-ku/administrative-offices/parking-and-transportation/parking/parking-zones.htm for more information.

Get to know your professors.

Introduce yourself and ask questions, participate in the discussions and visit during their office hours. Faculty can be the key to your success at KU and they are here to help. In addition, if you plan on attending graduate or professional school, you will need recommendations from faculty members who know you and the quality of your academic work.

Get involved. Over and over again, transfer students suggest joining student organizations. These groups come with built-in social networks and best of all, you can make new friends while pursuing your interests. Mingling and working with members of student groups is a sure fire way to get you settled in.

Familiarize yourself with Kutztown's Rohrbach Library.

Rohrbach Library is probably very different from the library at your previous institution and offers a lot more than just books. Become acquainted with the services and the layout before the deadline of your first paper.


