

Student Learning Outcome (SLO) #1A: Communicate clearly and effectively orally and in writing.

Oral Communication

Definition: Oral communication is a prepared, purposeful speaking designed to increase knowledge, to foster understanding, or to promote change in the listeners' attitudes, values, beliefs, or behaviors.

This SLO is met in the following General Education categories: A3 - Communicating with and about the World: Attention and adaptation to audiences is highlighted as necessary for successful communication of general as well as specific content. Courses in this category help students develop skills in reading, writing, listening, and speaking.
