 What are "Social Determinants"?



 "Social Determinants" are the cultural, social, economic, health, and environmental conditions at the national, regional, community, and family levels that influence one's life chances, including one's future physical and behavioral health.

Examples of Negative Social Determinants

Poverty

Racial, Sexual, and Social Discrimination

Social Exclusion

Poor Quality Education

Lack of Access to Quality Health Care

Little or No Access to Quality Foods

Abundant Access to Fructose, Fatty Foods, etc.

Good Health Education





Health Differences Between UK and the US for 55-64 Year Olds




Cancer

Three Levels for Action

Structural drivers at the global, national, and local levels.

Monitoring, and training, research

Conditions in which geople are born, live, work, and age

Goals of Action

Social justice

Empowerment as a means – material, psychosocial, political

Creating the conditions for people to take control of their lives

Social Justice

Good health is a human right

All people are valued equally

Must address disparities and promote equity

Disparities and Equity

Disparity: A difference between two groups, irrespective of its source

Equity intends to address disparities that are due to social disadvantage

Equity intends to distribute resources based on need




