One of the many accomplishments they experienced was the planning, follow through and delivery of their Service Learning Project. As a group, they worked with Upward Bound and Allen High School staff to put together a Student vs. Staff Basketball Fundraiser. This event

This past summer, the students participated in a six-week summer program. During the first five weeks, students attended classes at Allen High School and participated in college visits. During the sixth week, the students participated in an on campus residential experience at Kutztown University. The residential experience allowed for the students to move into a college dorm room, attend lectures and presentations, dine in the student dinning hall, participate in social and recreational activities and get an overall college student experience.

My staff and I are looking forward to continuing to get to know our new students and continuing to provide support services and creating new opportunities for all of our students. We are also very excited about our new Service Learning Project. This summer, the students and staff began working on planning for a Poetry Coffee House event. 


#### Math—For the FUN of it!
